



Geography

- Population density of 44 people per hectare (higher than borough average of 27)








A Map of Facilities in Pleck Ward














Population Structure

- Fewer over 65's to borough













Economic Summary



65.7% of working age people in this ward were **economically active** (2011 Census), this was well below the Walsall value of 74% and the National Value of 76.8%

The largest **occupation group** in the ward was Elementary Occupations (17.6%) followed by Process plant & machine operators (14.1%)

In November 2017 there were **350 benefit claimants** in the ward – 205 men and 145






Deprivation





Childhood Obesity



- The above charts show the proportion of children resident in the ward that are overweight or obese in Reception (Aged 5) and in Year 6 (Age 10).
- Of the 20 Walsall wards, Pleck ranks 12th in Reception and 2nd in Year 6 in terms of the prevalence of excess weight in childhood.
















- Town Centre Transport Package completed 2009.
