 people per hectare (higher than borough average of 27.3).








Walsall Ward Map










Economic Summary



64.9% of working age people in Palfrey ward were economically active. This
was much lower than the Walsall value of 74.0% and the National Value of 76.8%

Unemployment Claimants (aged 16-64), May 2019

•	The largest occupation group in the ward was
	Elementary Occupations (17.0%) followed by
	Process, Plant & Machine Operators (12.6%) and
	Professional (12.6%) (2011)*.

- Of working age ward residents, over a quarter (26.5%) had **no formal qualifications**. Walsall's value was 24.3%, and 15.0% nationally (2011)*.
- In May 2019, 5.8% of working aged residents (aged 16-64) were unemployed and seeking work. This equated to 619 people and was slightly above the Walsall average of 5.0%.








A mixture of deprivation withithe ward with levels amongst the 20% most deprived toward the north – Caldmore South & Caldmore West.




Childhood Obesity in Palfrey

Key Messages:

- In Palfrey the rate of excess weight in Reception Children has slightly decreased between 2015 2018.
- Palfrey ranks 9th / 20 wards (1st = lowest rate) for excess weight in Reception aged children
- However, in Year 6 children, the rate of excess weight continues to increase.
- Palfrey ranks 19th/20 wards for excess weight (1st = lowest rate) for excess weight in Y6 children.











Voluntary & Community Organisations



There is strength within the Palfrey community with a number of community groups including:

- Palfrey Big Local programme being run by Local Trust and funded through the Big Lottery Fund to support local residents in improving their local area.
- Palfrey Children's Centre (commissioned by CGL) services aimed at children 0-19 and their families.
- Neighbourhood Watch a dedicated group of residents devoted to crime & vandalism prevention within Palfrey.
- British Muslim Youth Group open access centre based youth provision 9-19 year olds to play sports, pool, table football, badminton, dodgeball, gaming & chill out zones.
- Palfrey Community Centre Palfrey Junior School and Palfrey Big Local will deliver community activities for local residents including a summer play scheme, English classes for parents & social / cultural events.
- Masjid Al Farouq hosted a cohesion visit on 10 April 2019as part of The Place of Worship visits.
- Empowering Women workshops to inspire, empower and support women to take important steps in their lives – confidence building, improving skills etc.

Regeneration








- Home to a number of local centres providing services: Caldmore, Palfrey and Fullbrook as well as Bescot Retail Park. Palfrey Park is a significant local landmark and is cited as one of Walsall Council's flagship greenspaces.
- Part of the SRB 5 Initiative, included the Sure Start Palfrey Children's Centre.
- Home to a number of key businesses including: Barhale, Middleton Paper, Marlborough of England (handcrafted leather bags and hip flasks) and head office of the RAC Group Limited.
- Excellent transport links with Bescot Train Station (links to Walsall and Birmingham) and M6 J9.
- Bescot Point currently being marketed and provides a significant investment opportunity for industrial and commercial uses.
- League 2 Walsall Football Club and Joseph Leckie Academy are located within the Ward. The Academy has benefitted from recent expansion.
- Dale Street Family Centre declared surplus to requirements and will be marketed in due course. Future of Palfrey CA building being considered to safeguard community interests.
- Highway improvements (signals) completed between Dickinson Drive and West Bromwich Road. Further proposal for Bescot Crescent (widening).
- Proposals for a railway sleeper factory adjacent to Ward (Sandwell MBC).
