


Geography






- Covers 2.35 sq km (235 ha)

- Population density of 53.9 people per hectare (higher than borough average of 27.3)



Walsall Ward Map





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



Economic Summary



78.5% of working age people in Willenhall North ward were economically active. This was higher than the Walsall value of 74.0% and the national value of 76.8% (2011)*.

Unemployment Claimants (aged 16-64), May 2019

•	The largest occupation group in the ward was
	Skilled Trades (15.7%) followed Administrative &
	Secretarial (12.4%) (2011)*.

- Of working age ward residents, over a fifth (21.7%) had no formal qualifications. Walsall's value was 24.3%, and 15.0% nationally (2011)*.
- In May 2019, 4.3% of working aged residents (aged 16-64) were unemployed and seeking work. This equated to 331 people and was slightly below the Walsall average of 5.0%.






5 Level of deprivation







Childhood Obesity in Willenhall North

Key Messages:

- In Willenhall North, the rate of excess weight in Reception Children has increased.
- Willenhall North ranks 8th/20 wards (1st = lowest rate) for excess weight in Reception aged children.
- In Year 6 children, the rate of excess weight has also increased.
- Willenhall North ranks 14th/20 wards for excess weight (1st = lowest rate) for excess weight in Y6 children.





Willenhall North ward has a below average proportion of residents providing unpaid care – 11.1% (Borough = 11.4%).







Voluntary & Community Organisations




- The Loft Youth Club opened 28th Feb 2018. Opens Thursday evenings.
 Operating from the Community Hub in New Invention Square (former library) once a week.
- Youth Shelter opposite New Invention Square Young people have used the site & are actively signposted to it by WM Police / Shop owners & youth teams.
- 1st Short Heath Scout Group Coltham Road.
- Beacon Football Club at Beacon School.
- Martial Arts Working Men's Club.
- Coltham Road Church range of community based activities to support local groups & individuals such as Award Winning Photography Club, dance sessions, toddler sessions & book clubs.

Regeneration






- Primarily residential ward with good access to open space including Short Heath Park.
- Access to two local centres: Coppice Farm and New Invention providing day-to-day needs primarily for convenience shopping and community facilities. New Invention is particularly well used but with known anti-social behaviour issues. Former Co-op site in Coppice Farm Centre now the site of a new Aldi.
- New Invention library closure in June 2017 as part of library closures across the Borough, former library site now occupied by Frank F Harrison CA.
- Land adjacent to New Invention Methodist Church subject of long-standing enforcement case for unauthorised vehicle repairs – now largely resolved by new development.
- Opportunities for residential development with sites allocated for housing in the SAD: former Allens Centre, Essington Lodge (currently occupied by Children's Services), New Invention Methodist Church (locally listed building) and Lichfield Road, Willenhall – currently an active petrol station.
