Welcome to Bentley and Darlaston North









Did you know?

- History Bentley Old Hall stood in the north of Darlaston until the early 20th century. Bentley Hall was one of several country houses where in 1651, after the Battle of Worcester, the future Charles II was sheltered here by Colonel John Lane. The future king finally escaped disguised as the servant of <u>Jane Lane</u>, the colonel's sister. A special needs school is named after Jane Lane. Bentley Old Hall grounds were redeveloped as a housing estate in the 1950s.
- Famous Residents Sue Nicholls (born 1943), long running Coronation Street soap actress known as 'Audrey Roberts'.
 Mark Rhodes (born 1981) ITV's Pop Idol runner up in 2003.
- Landmark Darlaston had its own windmill from as early as 1695, the mill continued to be in use until about 1860.




- Covers 4.27 sq km (426.5 ha)



Bentley and Darlaston North Assets Map








Claimant Count

Bentley and Darlaston North's occupational profile differs from Walsall in some key


areas: substantially more employed in elementary occupations (16.7%, Walsall 13.5%)



- Bentley and Darlaston North's Claimant Count (Jobseekers Allowance) is approximately 6.3 per 100 working age adults.
- This is slightly above the borough rate of 5.3, and ranks the ward as the 8th highest claimant rate.

Deprivation





Bentley and Darlaston North ranks is a highly deprived area, with most of its neighbourhoods falling within the 20% most deprived areas in England (decile 1-2).

It faces particular deprivation challenges with:

- Adult Skills (decile 1)
- Education, Skills and Training (decile 1)
- Income (decile 1)
- Children and Older people (decile 1)

It ranks very positively for lack of **Barriers to Housing and Services**, falling within the 8th decile of England areas.



- Bentley & Darlaston North's household population of full-time students and schoolchildren, aged over 5yrs, is 26.4%, above the Walsall figure(22.1%) and has twice the number of Pelsall's students.
- Single-family households consisting of a lone parent with dependent children, make up 13% of households, this is 3rd highest in borough. The number of lone parent households in Bentley and Darlaston North (709) is more than double that of Aldridge Central & South (340) and over three times as many as the number in Paddock (223)
- Lower number of homeowners 48.7% are owned. Of those,54% are owned outright, without a mortgage or shared ownership. Bentley and Darlaston North has average of households(16.2%) where residents rent privately or live rent free (Walsall 16.5%). One in three homes in Peck are socially rented (34.5%) on par with Bloxwich East.
- The number of households living with no central heating across the borough has
 positively decreased by about half since 2011. Bentley & Darlaston North has an
 average proportion of households living without central heating at 1.36%, the Walsall
 figure is 1.61%. There are 74 households living with no central heating, this ranks 9th
 highest in percentage, with number just below Rushall Shelfield (75) & Blakenall (75)


% Households in Ward with no Central heating





Development & Regeneration

- Darlaston District Centre with anchor retailer- Asda, and multiple independents.
- High Quality Employment Areas and supporting strategic companies including EMR, Veolia, Nationwide Platforms, KTC Edibles, ZF Lemforder, Lone Star, AF Blakemore. As well as the Black Country Enterprise Zone Darlaston sites providing local employment uses and opportunities.
- Strategic transport improvements including the £78m M6 Junction 10 works nearing completion and completed £26m Darlaston Access Project to help reduce congestion and travel times on highways network.
- Out of centre retail and leisure including Ikea, Boundary Mill, and Grosvenor Casino. The former Gala Bingo and Showcase Cinema sites are subject to development proposals.
- Walking and cycling improvements including Connecting Bentley Phase 2 and canal corridor towpath.
- £20m awarded by government for the Darlaston Long Term Town Plan to be spent on community needs and local priorities over 10 years.
- Planned new Darlaston Rail Station will provide passengers services to Birmingham, Wolverhampton and Walsall and is estimated to open in 2025/26.
- Planning consent for Walsall 90 (former Holiday Inn site) for the construction of a new industrial unit.
- Planning application under assessment for a proposed new Lidl foodstore on the site of the former Gala Bingo.
- Planning application under assessment for a new car showroom and planning consent granted for temporary open storage use on the former Showcase Cinema site.
- Council works to provide continued support to businesses/landowners with regard to their development requirements and growth aspirations





Census 2021, resident population




Population Pyramid

Key Points:


- Bentley and Darlaston North has one of the younger populations of Walsall's wards, with only around 1 in 7 people over the age of 65yrs old, and a median age of 35 years old, approximately 4 years below the Borough average (39 years). There is a similar portion of children aged under 16yrs to that in Birchills Leamore ward and a high proportion of 5yr-14yr olds, when compared to Walsall overall.
- Bentley and Darlaston North's population density ranks central, equating to 3,360 people per sq. km. For context, Walsall's density is 2,733, and Aldridge North & Walsall Wood has roughly half as many people per sq. km (1,676).
- Ethnically, the ward has seen a 9% decline in White British population since 2011 reducing from 72% to 63%. Asian Ethnicity makes up almost a quarter of the ward, with smaller populations of Black (6%), Mixed (6%) and Other (2%).



Language and Religion



84% of Households where All Adults use English as main language





- 91% of households have all or at least one adult where English is the main language. When English is not the main spoken language in the home, 31% of these residents cannot speak English or cannot speak it well matching Pleck.
- Ward has the 6th highest proportion of non-English speakers in households (383) 7% of all households in the ward, compared to only 0.5% in Pelsall (26).

38% household residents are Christian (Borough 45%)

- Bentley and Darlaston North has a majority population of Christian residents (38.0%) but this is lower the Walsall percentage of 44.7%. It has a higher proportion of Muslims (16.9%) than the borough (11.3%) and the lowest Buddhist population in the borough with only 5 x residents equating to 0.0%
- 30% of Bentley and Darlaston Norths residents reported in 2021 Census as having No Religion, this is in line with Walsall (30.2%)




Non-UK Country of Birth

Bentley and Darlaston North versus Borough Comparison



Key Points:

- With 82.6% of residents being UK born, Bentley and Darlaston North has the 6th lowest proportion of UK born residents of the 20 Walsall wards.
- At approximately 17.4%, almost 1 in 6 of Bentley and Darlaston North's residents were born outside of the UK, which is slightly above the borough's 14.7%.
- The largest area or non-UK birth is the Middle East and Asia, at around 1,333 residents or approximately 9.3% (Walsall 8%). There are also proportionately more residents whom were born in Africa (2.7%) and EU8, at 2.2% (2004 EU enlargement nations such as Poland, Hungary, Lithuania, Slovenia and Slovakia).
- There are roughly similar levels of EU14 born residents as the rest of the borough: founding EU states such as Germany, France, Italy and Spain, accounting for 1.5% of the ward's population (209 residents).



Key Points:

- Social Segmentation is a means of categorising residential populations by shared socio-economic traits and similar behaviours.
- Bentley and Darlaston North features a wide range of segments, with the largest three being Family Basics, Modest Traditions and Vintage Value. These are defined on the right of this page.
- Family Basics accounts for almost a third of households: low earning families with limited education, multiple children, poorer quality housing, and little disposable income. It is a segment highly vulnerable to economic shock/crises i.e. fuel/energy, high inflation
- Typical traits of the majority of households in this ward are low income, limited discretionary income and potential for fuel poverty.





% Children who reached a good level of development in 2022




Children are defined as having reached a good level of development at the end of their Reception year if they have achieved at least the expected level in prime and specific areas of learning.

The overall GLD for Walsall in 2022 was 59%. The percentage of children who reside in the **Bentley & Darlaston North** ward achieving a GLD is lower then the LA average and 9% lower than the national average. **Bentley & Darlaston North** ward are ranked 7th lowest achieving compared to other wards in Walsall.

Achieving GCSE English and maths in 2022





Key Points:

Attainment data by ward is matched based on children resident in the ward who attended <u>any</u> Walsall school within the local authority. Any children who attended an out of borough school are excluded from the analysis.

Pupils take national curriculum assessments in year 6 at the end of KS2, when most will reach the age of 11. Pupils take tests commonly referred to as SATs.

A higher proportion of children who reside in the **Bentley & Darlaston North** ward achieved the expected standard across all core subjects when com[pared to LA and National outcomes.

At the end of KS4 (Year 11) pupils sit examinations in a range of GCSE and other vocational qualifications.

The percentage of pupils in Walsall who achieved at least a grade 4 or above in English and maths GCSE is slightly below national at 63%. A smaller proportion of students resident in the Bentley & Darlaston North ward achieved a standard pass. (58%)


36% of students who live in the ward achieved a good pass in English and maths GCSE– 8% lower than the Walsall LA figure and 11% below the National average.

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Council Tax Reduction (CTR) household claimants – working age



35.9%.

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

- Bentley and Darlaston North has approximately average general health for the borough, with 78% of residents rating their health as good or better. This is below the England average of 82.1%.
- At 7.3% of the population, approximately 1 in 14 residents rate their health as bad or worse.

- 4.5% have a long term physical or mental Health condition but daily activities are not limited, this ranks below Walsall (5.5%) with a similar number to Blakenall





Child Healthy Weight




The prevalence of Reception-aged children who are overweight or obese in Bentley and Darlaston North has increased in trend in recent years and is significantly higher than the Walsall average and the national rate.



The prevalence of Year 6 children who are overweight or obese in Bentley and Darlaston North has shown a slight decrease in the most recent year and is now similar to the average for Walsall, but significantly higher than the national rate.

Weight category of children by ward






Overall, in Bentley and Darlaston North, around






